It is the policy of South Plains College for the Spring 2021 semester that as a condition of on-campus enrollment, all students are required to engage in safe behaviors to avoid the spread of COVID-19 in the SPC community. I. COURSE INFORMATION

A. <u>COURSE DESCRIPTION:</u>

Prerequisite: 3 hours of accounting or consent of instructor. Introduction to utilizing the computer in maintaining accounting records with primary emphasis on a general ledger package.

B. LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. The student will utilize an application software to perform accounting tasks.
- 2. Maintain records
- 3. prepare reports
- 4. analyze reports for a business entity.
- 5. Complete a comprehensive project
- 6. Explain the components of general ledger software.
- **C.** <u>STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES ASSESSMENT:</u> This will vary and is geared towards Task Stream and WECM standards. This course will be assessed on an annual basis.
- D. <u>ATTENDANCE POLICY:</u> Accessing this course on a regular basis is extremely important in order to complete the required assignments. Students that <u>DO NOT</u> log in to Blackboard each week will be dropped from this course with a grade of "F." Students that log in to Blackboard but <u>DO NOT COMPLETE ASSIGNMENTS</u> will not be dropped, but will receive the grade they have earned for the assignments that have been completed.

Punctual and regular attendance is required of all students.

Students are expected to attend all classes in order to be successful in a course. The student may be administratively withdrawn from the course when absences become excessive as defined in the course syllabus. After 4 unexcused absences, students will be warned of excessive absences. After 6 unexcused absences, students will be dropped from the course with an "X". If a student is absent on a day that a test is given, he or she will not be allowed to make up the test unless arrangements are made prior to the test day.

Any student not present at roll taking will be counted absent unless prior arrangements have been made. Roll will be taking at the *BEGINNING* of each class.

When an unavoidable reason for class absence arises, such as illness, an official trip authorized by the college or an official activity, the instructor **may** permit the student to make up work missed. It is the student's responsibility to complete work missed within a reasonable period of time as determined by the instructor. Students are officially enrolled in all courses for which they pay tuition and fees at the time of registration. Should a student, for any reason, delay in reporting to a class after official enrollment, absences will be attributed to the student from the first-class meeting.

Students who enroll in a course but have "Never Attended" by the official census date, as reported by the faculty member, will be administratively dropped by the Office of Admissions and Records. A student who does not meet the attendance requirements of a class as stated in the course syllabus and does not officially withdraw from that course by the official census date of the semester may be administratively withdrawn from that course a grade of "X" or "F" as determined by the instructor. Instructors are responsible for clearly stating their administrative drop policy in the course syllabus, and it is the student's responsibility to be aware of that policy.

It is the student's responsibility to verify administrative drops for excessive absences through MySPC using his or her student online account. If it is determined that a student is awarded financial aid for a class or classes in which the student never attended or participated, the financial aid award will be adjusted in accordance with the classes in which the student did attend/participate and the student will owe any balance resulting from the adjustment.

- **2.** Cutting and pasting together information from books, articles, other papers, or online sites without providing proper documentation;
- **3.** Using direct quotations (three or more words) from a source without showing them to be direct quotations and citing them; or
- **4.** Missing in-text citations.

<u>Cheating</u> violations include, but *are not* limited to, the following:

- **1.** Obtaining an examination by stealing or collusion;
- 2. Discovering the content of an examination before it is given;
- **3.** Using an unauthorized source of information (notes, textbook, text messaging, internet, apps) during an examination, quiz, or homework assignment;
- **4.** Entering an office or building to obtain an unfair advantage;
- **5.** Taking an examination for another;
- 6. Altering grade records;
- 7. Copying another's work during an examination or on a homework assignment;
- 8. Rewriting another student's work in Peer Editing so that the writing is no longer the original student's;
- **9.** Taking pictures of a test, test answers, or someone else's paper.
